Homemade Yellow Cake

Ingredients

- * 3 1/2 cups cake flour
- * 1 tbsp. baking powder
- * 1 tsp. salt
- * 2 cups sugar
- * 1 (3 1/2 oz.) package instant vanilla pudding
- * 6 tbsp. butter, softened
- * 6 tbsp. butter flavor shortening
- * 1 1/2 cups milk
- * 1 tbsp. vanilla extract
- * 1/2 cup sour cream
- * 4 eggs

Directions

- 1. Cream together butter, shortening, sugar, and puddina.
- Add eggs in one at a time.
- Add in sour cream and vanilla. Mix well.
- Sift together flour, baking powder, and salt.
- 5. Add flour mixture into butter mixture alternately with milk, starting and finishing with flour mixture.
- 6. Pour into well-greased and floured 13 X 9 pan.
- Bake at 350 F for 40-50 minutes.
- Variation for White Cake: Use 4 egg whites instead of the whole eaas.
- Variation for Spice Cake: Add 1 1/2 teaspoons cinnamon, 1/4+1/8 teaspoon ground allspice, 1/4+1/8 teaspoon ground cloves to the flour mixture.
- 10. Variation for Chocolate Cake: Use chocolate pudding mix and 1/3 cups cocoa.
