

Amazing Challah Bread

Ingredients:

- 4 (.25 oz) packages quick-rise yeast
- 4 cups warm water (110 degrees F/45 degrees C)
- 2 tablespoons salt
- 3/4 cup white sugar
- 1 cup margarine, melted
- 5 eggs
- 12 cups bread flour, or as needed
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

Directions:

Sprinkle the yeast over the water in a large bowl, and stir gently to moisten the yeast. Stir in salt, sugar, margarine, and 4 eggs, and beat well. Gradually mix in the flour, 1 cup at a time, up to 12 cups, until the dough becomes slightly tacky but not wet. Turn the dough out onto a floured surface, and knead until smooth and elastic, 8 to 10 minutes.

Grease baking sheets, or line them with parchment paper and set aside.

Cut the bread dough into 4 equal-sized pieces (or 2 pieces to make 2 large loaves). Cut each piece into thirds for 3-strand braided loaves. Working on a floured surface, roll the small dough pieces into ropes about the thickness of your thumb and about 12 inches long. Ropes should be fatter in the middle and thinner at the ends. Pinch 3 ropes together at the top and braid them. Starting with the strand to the right, move it to the left over the middle strand (that strand becomes the new middle strand.) Take the strand farthest to the left, and move it over the new middle strand. Continue braiding, alternating sides each time, until the loaf is braided, and pinch the ends together and fold them underneath for a neat look. Repeat for the remaining loaves.

Place the loaves onto the prepared baking sheets, and let rise until double in size, 1 to 1 1/2 hours.

Preheat an oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Whisk 1 egg with vanilla extract in a small bowl, and brush the loaves with the egg wash.

Bake in the preheated oven until the tops are shiny and golden brown, about 30 minutes. Let cool before slicing.

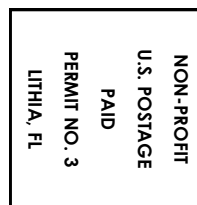

When Cedarkirk held its very first summer camp in 1971, I was nine years old...not quite old enough to be a camper. But my older brother was a camper that summer and when I went with my mom to pick him up I saw the tents they camped in right next to Streetman Drive, and the snakes they had caught while clearing a road through the woods. Camp looked pretty exciting; I couldn't wait till I was old enough to go! When I was able to go a couple years later, the road was open and Cedar Lodge had been built, but not much else. We swam in the river; I never tired of the rope swing, climbing up the bank and getting in line to go again, over and over. I remember a canoe trip interrupted by a thunderstorm so fierce that we pulled off the

river and huddled in the woods singing hymns until the storm passed. Downstairs Cedar was the place we square danced to the calling of founding director A. T. Brown. I returned to camp for several years as the cabins, pool and pavilion were added. In retrospect, I can see the key elements that made that experience so special and why it had such an impact on me. It was a place of excitement and fun, yet a place of peace; there was genuine caring from all of the adult leaders and counselors. Everyone, regardless of where they came from or where they were in their faith, was encouraged to get to know and grow closer to Christ. Being a Christian could be fun! It could

even be cool! So you see, Cedarkirk has grown and changed some over the years, but the summer camp experience has not changed much at all.

Fast forward to about 2008. I was invited to join the Cedarkirk Board and I gladly accepted. When I joined the Board, I learned how, in the years since I was a camper, Cedarkirk's ministry had expanded beyond summer camp and Presbyterian church retreats. I feel privileged to be a Board member and I also feel a great responsibility to continue the transformative camp ministry and to help further expand this wonderful ministry of hospitality to reach and serve more people.
