

Double Layer Pumpkin Cheesecake

Ingredients

- * 2 (8 oz.) packages cream cheese, softened
- * 1/2 cup white sugar
- * 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
- * 2 eggs
- * 1 (9 inch) prepared graham cracker crust
- * 1/2 cup pumpkin puree
- * 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- * 1 pinch ground cloves
- * 1 pinch ground nutmeg
- * 1/2 cup frozen whipping topping, thawed

Directions

1. Preheat oven to 325 degrees F.
2. In a large bowl, combine cream cheese, sugar and vanilla. Beat until smooth. Blend in eggs one at a time. Remove 1 cup of batter and spread into bottom of crust; set aside.
3. Add pumpkin, cinnamon, cloves and nutmeg to the remaining batter and stir gently until well blended. Carefully spread over the batter in the crust.
4. Bake in preheated oven for 35 to 40 minutes, or until center is almost set. Allow to cool, then refrigerate for 3 hours or overnight. Cover with whipped topping before serving.

 Cook Time: 40 minutes

Board Member Corner—Susie Wills

Ursula Goodenough introduces her book *The Sacred Depths of Nature* with the observation that spiritual life is concerned with two fundamental questions: how things are and which things matter. The recent landing of the Philae lander on a comet was a major human achievement in advancing our knowledge of "how things are" in the realms of outer space, helping us understand the origins of God's universe and the fundamental forces that govern matter and life. When it comes to knowing "which things matter," we turn in the other direction, toward our inner space. We worship, study scripture, pray, and open our minds to the really big questions: why God created the world and ourselves in God's image, our understanding of good and evil, and what it means to be human. What better place to explore how things are and which things matter than under a canopy of palms and giant philodendrons, drifting down a tropical river in a canoe or gazing at the starry night sky next to a blazing campfire.

My first weekend at Cedarkirk was in 2006 with First Presbyterian Church, Sarasota Family Camp. We had organized a program of Bible study, crafts, recreation, music and fellowship around the theme of

God's good creation. At the time, my job was on the administrative staff of First Presbyterian, immersed in all the details of church operations. I knew these families as church members, names on a roll, pictures in the directory. I knew the children as Sunday school students and cherub choir singers and confirmands. I knew the adults as elders, committee members, Sunday school teachers, choristers, bell ringers, Presbyterian Women, missionaries, ushers, worship planners, musicians, sound technicians, and faithful servants who turned out for our programs and ministries. But that weekend, I got to know them as God's creatures and fellow stewards of God's good creation. Of course, this kind of experience could take place anywhere that church friends gather to play, learn, worship and pray. But for me it happened at Cedarkirk, and it has now become a special place for me in many other ways.

When the Peace Rive Presbytery nominating committee called me to serve on the Cedarkirk board, I knew immediately that I would love this ministry. I'm thrilled to see Cedarkirk's plans and visions for growing in new directions, serving new populations, expanding

programs, and reaching out to the churches in the Florida Gulf Coast region. As I write this, I am hosting a weekend retreat where I can serve the church and at the same time receive the blessings of the Christian life in worship and fellowship in a natural sanctuary. When I awakened from a restful night (in the beautiful Hickory Lodge with private bedrooms and baths) and walked out into the fresh morning air, the stillness was overwhelming. A spontaneous prayer rose up from the silence: "Thank you, God, for this time apart from the noise and nonsense that we have created, for revealing how things are in the world you created for us."

One of the founders of our Reformed tradition, John Calvin, remarked that God, revealed supremely in Jesus Christ and in Holy Scripture, is also revealed in the splendor of creation, echoing the Psalmist who saw God's glory in the heavens and handiwork in the firmament. Christian fellowship in the open air, close to the ground, in the midst of the buzzing, budding, crawling and flying realm of nature is a wonderful way to get in touch with how things are and which things matter.

Nuts and Bolts

 With cooler temperatures moving in, we find ourselves outdoors working on clearing our many trails and renewing the mulch footpaths around camp. We also welcomed back our winter volunteer who

helps with much of this work, and we are very thankful for his service. Cedarkirk has many opportunities for small groups to work alongside our volunteer and staff to aid in this ongoing care of the Cedarkirk grounds and buildings. We also have projects for Boy Scouts and
